Birding Singapore – 31st August 2015

There it is! Alex Cruz, a biology professor from Colorado, USA, and I had been waiting for something to happen and it did! Perched on a dead tree just 20 metres from us was the magnificent Grey-headed Fish Eagle. It ignored our presence and we were able to get some good photographs before it got nervous and flew off to the opposite bank of MacRitchie Reservoir. This was the highlight of an otherwise quiet morning in the rainforests of the Central Catchment Nature Reserve. We also got good looks at Lineated Barbet and Common Flameback as well as a single Black-headed Bubul, a locally endangered species.

We climbed to the top of Jelutong Tower to scan for canopy birds but it was one of the quieter mornings and we did not see anything exceptional other than the usual bulbuls, flowerpeckers and sunbirds. Coming down from the tower, we stopped to rest at the mid-point and were surprised to see a pair of Blue-winged Leafbirds and a very well concealed Red-crowned Barbet. After taking some photos, we left the tower and walked out to the carpark. The walk was quiet but we did encounter a cooperative Little Spiderhunter and a shy Forest Wagtail. Despite the hazy weather, we managed a respectable 42 species.

It was breakfast time and we opted for *roti prata* and tea at a coffee shop in Bukit Timah. After that, we decided to explore the nearby hill park of Bukit Batok. We spent almost ninety minutes here to see a good variety of interesting birds including a pale morph Changeable Hawk Eagle, Glossy Swiftlet, a family of Straw-headed Bulbuls and the spectacular Crimson Sunbird.

Next, we moved north to Sungei Buloh Wetland Reserve. The tide was high and so the river was rather empty except for Grey Heron and some escaped storks. We stopped by the main pond and found a large group of Great and Little Egrets and many shorebirds, mainly Common Redshanks. Back at the visitor centre, we saw several large Malayan Water Monitors and a male Scarlet-backed Flowerpecker. We also

explored the mangrove boardwalk and added Oriental Dollarbird and Copper-throated Sunbird. It was a good stop as we logged 34 species in just ninety minutes.

Lunch was next and we stopped by a seafood restaurant by the scenic Woodlands Waterfront. The food was good and we enjoyed the sea breeze.

We had one final stop so we moved on to Bishan Park. We arrived at 4.30 pm and spent some time exploring the stream and the parkland. We were delighted to see 3-4 Grey-rumped Treeswifts and an immature Slat-breasted Rail to conclude the day's birding. Overall, we had recorded some 72 species of birds and also some interesting wildlife such as Long-tailed Macaque, Malayan Box Tortoise, Clouded Monitor and Common Treeshrew.
